### Images

Images and Crosses are covered after the 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent until Easter vigil. Explanations:

1. We use veils to alert us of the special time that we are in. When we walk into the Church and notice everything is covered we immediately know that something is different. These last two weeks of Lent are meant to be a time of immediate preparation for the Sacred Triduum. These veils are a forceful reminder to get ready.
2. The veil focuses our attention on the words being said in the Mass. When we listen to the Passion narrative our senses are allowed to focus on the striking words from the Gospel and truly enter into the scene.
3. The Church uses veils to produce a heightened sense of anticipation for Easter Sunday.

The unveiling before Easter Vigil is a great reminder of our own life on earth. We live in a 'veiled' world in exile from our true home. It is only through salvation that the veil is lifted and we are truly able to see the beauty of everything in our lives

### **Washing of the feet on Holy Thursday**

The act of washing the feet serves as a picture of Jesus' ultimate mission: to serve humanity through his humble death on a cross a death that washes us clean from all sin and servanthood in forgiving sinners. Jesus intends his demonstration of humility to serve as an example to his disciples. 1 Samuel 25:41 a biblical passage where an honored person offers to wash feet as a sign of humility. When Jesus rose from the Last Supper and began to wash the feet of his apostles, he was doing the work of the lowliest servant. The disciples must have been stunned at this act of humility and condescension. Washing feet was more properly the disciples work but no one had volunteered for the job. Jesus came to earth not as King and Conqueror but as the suffering servant of Isaiah 53

### **Eucharistic Adoration**

On the night of Holy Thursday Eucharistic Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament takes place where the people remain in the presence of the Eucharist as the disciple's Eucharist as the disciples kept vigil with Christ. Following the last supper the disciples went with Jesus to the Mount of Olives where he would be betrayed. The procession from the main altar to the altar of repose after

the mass is symbolic of the movement of Jesus to the Garden of Gethsemane where he experiences great agony before his arrest and betrayal. This tradition of adoring our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament on Holy Thursday is often called "Night watch" or "Gethsemane watch" and recalls how Jesus invited his apostles to stay with him while he prayed. And he said to them, "My soul is very sorrowful even to death; remain here and watch. Mk 14:34

I invite you my dear parishioners to stay and adore Jesus.

### **The Sacred Triduum**

Sundown on Holy Thursday to sundown on Easter Sunday is considered the most solemn part of the liturgical year. This three-day period is known as Paschal Triduum or Sacred Triduum. The word comes from Latin tris(three) and dies(day).

The Sacred Triduum is one great festival recounting the last three days of Jesus' life on earth, the events of his passion, death and resurrection, when the lamb of God laid down his life in atonement for our sins. It is known as the paschal mystery because it is the ultimate fulfillment of the ancient Jewish Passover(pasch) which itself was a recollection of how God brought the Jews out of their slavery in Egypt. The spotless lamb was slaughtered at the Passover meal and consumed. That same night the destroying angel

"passed over" the homes marked with the blood of Passover lamb and those covered by the blood were saved. This was the Old Testament prefigurement of Jesus' work at the Last Supper where he inserted himself as the Paschal Lamb and Calvary where the sacrifice was offered to save us from our slavery to sin. With the eucharist we consume the victim that died for our sins. The Paschal Mystery is God's plan of redemption for the fallen human race through the passion, death and resurrection of the God-man Jesus Christ. It is one marvelous event stretched out over three days.

Holy Thursday

The evening mass on Holy Thursday is the mass of the Lord's Supper. This is where the church re-lives the institution of the Holy Eucharist as well as the institution of the Priesthood which took place on the evening before Jesus was crucified. The said mass concludes with a procession of the Blessed Sacrament to the Altar of Repose, a place where the consecrated host is kept away from the main altar where mass is normally celebrated.

Good Friday

It is a mandatory day of Fasting and Abstinence. This is the day of the crucifixion. The altar is plain and bare. There is no consecrated host in the tabernacle at the main altar. The candle by the tabernacle is put off and the tabernacle doors are left open to show

that it is empty. Jesus is gone. Good Friday is a solemn day of mourning and prayer. The ceremony on this day is not a mass but a communion service using consecrated hosts from Holy Thursday. The priest will begin the service by prostrating himself in front of the altar. Veneration of the cross usually takes place at this service.

### **Holy Saturday**

No daytime mass on this Easter Vigil Day.

A vigil mass is held after nightfall on Holy Saturday. It is divided into four parts:

- Service of Light(fire)
- Liturgy of the word
- Liturgy of Baptism
- Liturgy of the Eucharist

Easter Sunday is what we have been waiting for. The 40 days of fasting, prayer and almsgiving during lent was in preparation for this day.

I admonish all Catholics to participate in our Sacred Triduum celebration.
